Introduction

- Author generally thought to be John Mark, guided by Peter's teachings
- Recipients Gentile, specifically Roman, readers
- Time of writing mid-60s AD

The Ministry of John the Baptist (vv. 1-8)

- John the Baptist was the last Old Testament prophet
- John's birth is described in Luke 1:5-25, 57-80
- Mark references Exodus 23:20, Malachi 3:1 and Isaiah 40:3
- John's baptism symbolized repentance and cleansing from sin
- He recognized that his ministry would be eclipsed (John 3:30)

Why did John need to prepare the way for Jesus?

What are some instances of God moving in the wilderness?

What early Christian leader only knew the baptism of John?

Jesus' Baptism (vv. 9-11)

- Mark has no issue with Jesus being baptized
- Matthew offers an explanation from Jesus (Matt. 3:15)
- John explains Jesus' baptism as well as John's mission

What does Jesus' baptism tell us about how He saw John's mission?

Why don't the gospels connect the adult Jesus and John as relatives?

Temptation and the Start of His Ministry (vv. 12-15)

- Matthew and Luke highlight the end of Jesus' time with Satan
- Mark simply notes that Jesus was tempted for 40 days
 - We sometimes focus on the short duration on which Matthew and Luke focus instead of the prolonged time Jesus was under attack
- John's imprisonment and death will show back up in Chapter 6
 - While it is used as an historical marker here, one should not conclude that John's imprisonment led Jesus to head back to Galilee right away
