The Gospel of Mark

Lesson 12: Mark 6:1-13

Jesus is rejected in His hometown (vv. 1-6)

- Matt. 13:54-58
- Jesus makes an official visit to Nazareth with His disciples
- The astonishment of the people over His teaching is tinged with resentment, considering His background
- There is discussion among scholars over how they refer to Him
 - "the carpenter, the Son of Mary" or "the Son of the carpenter and Mary"
 - Being called the son of a woman would be an affront
- The people were "scandalized" by Jesus' teaching in their synagogue

What are the reasons these people are so bothered by Jesus?

- Jesus' saying is an old truism that He applies to His situation (v. 4)
- Mark is very frank about the works Jesus does (or doesn't do) in Nazareth
- The only time we see Jesus marveling in Mark (note Matt. 8:5-13; Luke 7:1-10)

What keeps Jesus from doing more in Nazareth?

The Twelve are sent out (vv. 7-13)

- This is the next logical step in the disciples' training
- The Twelve are commissioned as Jesus' official representatives

Why does Jesus send the disciples out two by two?

Matt. 10:1, 5-25 Luke 9:1-6

- Some apparent conflict between the instructions in the synoptics
 - Perhaps best explained by what to take and what not to procure
- Underlying Jesus' instructions is their total dependence on God
- They are to stay put, even if better accommodations become known
- Shaking the dust from their feet is tied to an old Jewish custom

How do Jesus' instructions relate to modern evangelistic efforts?

What dynamics are at work with shaking the dust off their feet?
