The Gospel of Mark

Lesson 17: Mark 7:24-37

A woman from Tyre demonstrates her faith (vv. 24-30)

- Mark may have placed this here as an illustration of the last section
- Tyre (in modern Lebanon) is about 35 miles from Capernaum
- Phoenicia was part of the Roman province of Syria
- It appears that Jesus is trying to get some long-needed rest
- Matthew has the woman continually crying out for help (15:23)

Why does Jesus use the children/dogs imagery?

What is notable about the woman's response to Jesus?

- This reference by someone to Jesus as Lord is the only one in Mark
- This is also the only time Mark records a distance miracle

Jesus heals a deaf and mute man (vv. 31-37)

- Critical scholars have had a hard time with Jesus' route of travel
- Mark uses a *hapax legomenon* to describe the man's speech impediment
 - The only other use of the word is in Isaiah 35:6 in the LXX

Why might Mark use this particular word?

• Jesus is very deliberate in taking the man aside and in His actions

What might be Jesus' reason(s) for interacting with the man in this manner?

- The man can hear and speak clearly after Jesus' touch
- Again, the people ignore Jesus' direction to keep quiet
- The people are thrilled "above measure"
 - This man seems to be of great value to the crowd
 - His sad condition could also have led them to think he cannot be healed
